Desire by Design: Woman Artists and New Technologies

ABSTRACT: This paper offers an analysis of several art projects on the net and artworks by women artists which rely on new technologies (VR, CD-Rom, Computer-operated systems or the Internet). It is proposed that these recent artworks have forced a shift in expectation in viewing and reception when compared with conventional 'art's viewing habits of 'distance' and contemplation. Interconnectivity and a new approach to understanding human perception are two models often proposed. This acknowledged shift in perception has been exploited by some artists as a valuable mechanism for questioning ideologies and conventional patterns of thought - for others, it is simply a new formalistic strategy, a new media which allows the continuation of the avantgarde project of experimentation. How do we recognise and analyse the difference in these approaches? And is there a gendered approach to these differences on the part of the artists or is it merely in the habits of the viewer?
